Holy Name Cathedral embraces campaign

As the seat of the Archdiocese of Chicago, Holy Name Cathedral is embracing *To Teach Who Christ Is* — to meet its own needs as well as the shared needs of our local Church. "*To Teach Who Christ Is* will advance us," says Msgr. Dan Mayall, rector/pastor of

The cathedral has currently raised 46 percent of its \$3.05 million campaign goal, but is working toward a \$5 million enhanced goal. Funds that will remain at the parish will be used to strengthen faith formation and fund capital work, according to Msgr. Mayall.

The cathedral is "ahead of the game," he says. "Holy Name is not answering a crisis — we are moving ahead to maintain our status as one of Chicago's premier parishes."

Thanks to funds raised during *To Teach Who Christ Is*, Holy Name will become a center of Catholic faith formation for all ages. New staff will focus on faith formation and special ministries that will bolster programming for all who walk through the cathedral's doors. The campus will also be enhanced: the cafeteria, club room and auditorium will see renovations, and technology and accessibility upgraded to improve parishioners' and visitors'

experiences. Lastly, an endowment fund will be created to meet future needs.

The To Teach Who Christ Is campaign is important to parishioners Jan Koors and Jay Tremblay, who see the campaign as a way to give back to community that has given them so much support since they moved to Chicago and joined the parish eight years ago. Plus, even though the Cathedral shares its facilities with an independent Catholic school, The Frances Xavier Warde School, the education component of the campaign is "still quite relevant" to the couple.

"The focus on education is paramount to us," says Jan. "We both went to Catholic schools. We value the role that a strong education has played in our lives and good fortune."

Supporters of Big Shoulders Fund, they see the campaign's goal of funding Catholic education as complementary to that charity's work in the inner city.

Jan and Jay feel buoyed in their support of *To Teach Who Christ Is*, and of all efforts at the cathedral, because of the dedication and involvement of other members of their parish family. Everyone needs to do their part — with time, talent and treasure, Jan notes, and they appreciate how active fellow parishioners are, even if they are unable to contribute on all three fronts.

"Life is a reinvention of ourselves every day, and you can't get smarter every day if you don't do something every day," reflects Arlene Wymer, parishioner. The second annual *Celebrating Catholic Education Breakfast* will be held at the Hyatt Regency Chicago from 7:15 to 9 a.m. on Tuesday, January 26.

Jim Rigg, Ph.D., the new Superintendent of Catholic Schools, will serve as the keynote speaker. Dr. Rigg will present his vision for the Archdiocese of Chicago's Catholic school system, which is the largest private school system in the United States.

Funds raised at the *Celebrating Catholic Education Breakfast* will support programs for schools and teachers through the Office of Catholic Schools and provide scholarships to students in Catholic schools in the Archdiocese through the Caritas Scholars Program, which was created with an early gift to the *To Teach Who Christ Is* campaign.

Nearly 500 business leaders, politicians and Catholic school supporters attended the inaugural *Celebrating Catholic Education Breakfast*, which raised \$240,000 for scholarships as well as awareness for the importance of Catholic education.

Tax advantageous year-end giving ideas

With 2015 quickly coming to a close, now is the time to reflect on year-end gifts to further help To Teach Who Christ Is, your parish or other ministries you support.

While some people see a simple gift of cash as the best way to make the most of charitable giving, others find sharing is easier with a gift of appreciated stock or a distribution directly from an IRA.

People can give gifts of appreciated stock to the Archdiocese of Chicago using the Stock Letter of Intention Form, which can be found online at www.toteachwhochristis. org/forms. This type of gift typically makes sense for someone who has held stock or mutual funds for the long term, as the donor can generally deduct the full fair-market value of the stock.

At this writing, people cannot make direct gifts from their IRA accounts to support their favorite charities and take full advantage of a law that has yet to be renewed for 2015. However, it can still make sense to use an IRA distribution for charitable giving.

If the law is not renewed for this year, making a direct distribution to the Archdiocese of Chicago to help your parish would be considered taxable income, but donors would be allowed a charitable tax deduction to help offset the taxes incurred by the distribution.

Contributions from individuals throughout the Archdiocese of Chicago to the *To Teach Who Christ Is* campaign are already helping parishes thrive, providing children with greater access to Catholic education, and developing new religious education initiatives. "These gifts have helped *To Teach Who Christ Is* exceed \$200 million in pledges toward our overall goal of \$350 million," says Peter de Keratry, campaign manager. "We have an amazing sense of hope for the future."

Exciting News: Wave IV parishes collectively exceed goal

Wave IV's 56 parishes have surpassed their collective goal of \$30.2 million — with 35 exceeding their individual goals.

"These parishes have put in an extraordinary amount of effort since July," says Peter de Keratry, campaign manager. "Their success is a testament to the leadership of pastors and parish Campaign Executive Committee members, as well as to the dedication so many of our faithful have to both their parishes and the mission and ministry of our local Church." More than \$31 million from 7,672 pledges during Wave IV. Parishes continue to conduct Commitment Weekends, and engage their entire parish families about their campaign pledge decision.
